
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


# 1.1 PENTRIDGE PRISON - LANDSCAPE HISTORY

Nicknamed the Bluestone College, HM Pentridge Prison has a well documented history, both of its methods of prisoner reform and its architectural developments. The patterns and arrangement of its landscape are less celebrated, yet still play a vital role

Construction of Administration, entrance building, B Division & two associated 14 yard Panopticons. Pentridge opens. At this time the Prison dwarfed the surrounding lanscape.

Completion of Division A and subsequent airing yard. Unlike the two airing yards at Division B, the Panopticon here was comprised of 16 yards.

Landscape design by Hugh Linaker, including a large paddock for vegetable crops south of Pentridge Blvd. Linaker was well known for his vertical & linear designs worked mostly on hospitals & psychiatric facilities.

Completion of Division A and subsequent airing yard. Unlike the two airing yards at Division B, the Panopticon here was comprised of 16 yards.

Pentridge closes. After 138 years of operation, the prison is no longer fit for purposes and thus decomissioned.

Remains of the Panopticon at Division B are uncovered. The 14 yarded structure is retained in excellent condition and serves as a reminder of its past life.

#### SITE DESCRIPTION & REFERENCE DOCUMENTS

Pentridge Coburg is the northern section of the decommissioned Pentridge Prison. Initially established in 1851 as replacement for the Melbourne Gaol the site was used as a prison until 1997. Many heritage listed building remain on site including Divisions A, B, D, E and H, B Annexe, the Administration Building, the Warden's Quarter, Rock-breaking Yards, Guard Towers as well as the iconic entrance and surrounding bluestone walls

# 1.3 UNDERSTANDING THE MASTER PLAN

#### FROM THE MASTERPLAN

To the north of the Piazza Precinct, is the 'Mixed Use' Precinct in the former women's prison section; the restored A Division building is a central focus. The major building adjacent A and H Division, in the heart of Pentridge, incorporates a consolidation of diverse commercial, community and residential activities. Community uses, such as childcare, community halls and artist studios, are anticipated within the heritage building. The multiplicity of building users share a permeable network of laneways and arcades that interchange with the adjoining piazza and courtyards.

# Two interconnected public spaces will form the focus of the northern area of the development.

These spaces create a respectful foreground to the heritage of Division A building, and provide open space and recreation. These spaces will focus on comfort, amenity and activities for local residents of all ages and abilities, and will be open to broader community use.

The most northern park has the character of a local community park that provides spaces and facilities for active and passive outdoor activities. The park will include a range of outdoor recreation facilities (potentially table seating, picnic tables and a lawn area.


The southern park has the character of a courtyard garden and will include all season productive trees (orchard groves), community gardens, formal gardens, toddler and children play spaces and a community building.


Tree canopies and open air structures will be strategically positioned in both spaces to enable access to sun and shade at all times of the day, throughout the year. A row of feature trees and pathway connect the two parks along the western edge.


#### Key design elements include:

- Threshold spaces and treatments to heritage spaces and buildings, particularly the Division A building;
- Appropriate integrated community building (south space);
- Resolution of level changes including integrated universal access (DDA compliant);
- A range of elements that cater for active and passive recreation and activities for people of all ages, interests and abilities (as above), particularly residents;
- A range of soft and hard scapes (such as pavements, lawns, gravels);
- Integration with the public realm spaces throughout the precinct

# **1.4 SITE ANALYSIS**







#### **EXISTING VEGETATION & OPEN SPACE**

- Mature street trees define the character along Champ street
- Coburg Lake reserve provides ample access to nature & recreation facilities and is edged by mature vegetation along Murray Road
- Large native eucalypts and palms are frequent
- New planting along Moonering Drive look to define the character of the redesigned Pentridge.
- Vegetation within site is nearly non-existent

#### **SUNLIGHT**

New buildings proposed at 8 storey & 9 storeys will limit afternoon access to sunlight for the adjacent courtyard. Combined with the existing A Division building sunlight to the fringes of the space will be limited and species selection and placement will need to respond to this.

#### **PEDESTRIAN CIRCULATION**

The current pedestrian circulation is reflects the strong perimeter wall of the site, with the main network following the extent of the wall. New development within the site has penetrated the wall, increasing circulation opportunities throughout the site.


An increase in public open space as the site develops will increase pedestrian movement through out the site, turning the surrounding walls from a barrier into a welcome gate into a new landscape.




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
# 2.0 DESIGN VISION

# 2.2 DESIGN PRINCIPLES








#### **BLURRING BOUNDARIES**

The Landscape around Building 01 & 02 acts to invite both residents and the public through the bluestone walls highlighting the Division A building and celebrating the blending of the new and old Pentridge. The landscape will have key movement pathways but use a combination of planting and surface treatments to invite users to interact with the landscape and buildings.



#### **CREATING THRESHOLDS**

An already clearly defined boundary, the role of landscape here is to ensure that users are struck with a sense of excitement and opportunity when arriving on site. Visitors will know they have entered Courtyard A & B from its gentle yet clear delineation of space.




#### **RESPECTING HERITAGE FORMS**


The landscape design seeks to respect the heriatge of the architecture by reflecting major design moments and materiality of the surrounding builtform. The design speaks directly to the forms of A division, ensuring the heritage building remains the focal point of the development, and views aren't obscurred by contemporary form or planting



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#### **INNER SANCTUARY**

The internal courtyard spaces and podium landscape combines to create a cohesive landscape typology that is both entirely site responsive, creating moments of lush planting contrasted with rolloing wild flowers. With a combination of lush species and a wild native palette the softscape will use principles of biophillic design to ensure the user can feel a sense of calm and familiarity within the landscape.




# **RECLAIMED LANDSCAPE**

Inspired from images of Pentridge pre-development, the landscape seeks to restore and instill a sense of natural order wherein planting form is wild and natural. A lack of overly manicured spaces seeks to compliment the strong building forms through contrast. As well as the use of aged and worn materiality that's appropriate to the place.



#### **WELCOMING THE PUBLIC**

The courtyard spaces to the frontage of the A Division building welcomes the public into the site. A wide range of landscape spaces offer residents and visitors a place to explore, discover and exprience the unique historical setting.




# 2.3 INTERPRETING ARCHITECTURAL HERITAGE ELEMENTS

Main Administraion Building - Constructed c1858-59

The Administration Building is centrally located along the original western bluestone wall of the site (A Wall). The doublestorey building is attributed to Public Works Department architect Gustav Joachimi. It


